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Theory and Practice of Resistance to Monoculture Course Syllabus

Course Description:

In this course we will examine theoretically and experientially models of historical and contemporary resistance to monocultural patterns of knowledge and social relations. Monoculture supports the major institutions of capitalist modernity and recent European scientific systems. Yet resistance to monoculture has historically emerged from groups who have somehow survived the onslaught of monoculture, including women; people of color; working classes, the unemployed, the homeless, the imprisoned, and the underclasses; gays, lesbians, transgendered persons and bisexuals; many peoples of the third worlds and first nations; and other groups. We will survey the knowledge systems of some of these groups, such as Curanderismo, Wicca, Chinese science and medicine, Santería, Buddhism, indigenous medical and spiritual traditions, and others as a way of understanding how race, class, gender, sexuality and nationality can lead to effective resistance and constructive social change.
